I learned such things as, "it is just as easy to 5 minutes early as 5 minutes late", "I can't is a coward too lazy to try", "the best helping hand is right on the end of your arm", "hard work will beat out genius every time", "don't lie, just accept responsibility for your actions and move on", and so many other things that helped me though life.

My mother was blunt, but honest. I got that trait from her. I have heard some people say I am too blunt and maybe they're right, but I don't waste time beating around the bush. We have enough politician that never give you any answers, I tell people what I believe is the truth about their design, process, engineering approach, etc. I don't do it to be mean, just honest. It saves the inventor a lot of time.

I never try to judge the merits of the idea, just facts about competition, price point, return on investment, costs, how to find distribution, etc. I like to help people succeed in our club and some have done it and I am very proud of them.

My mother went to the 11th grade and my father to the 9th grade so you may think they were dumb, but mother loved words, did the New York times cross word puzzle every morning after she got everyone off to school or work. She was a champion scrabble player and beat my cousin (who was a teacher and said he had never lost a game in Ohio) so bad that he said Ohio must not have any Scrabble players.

My dad would cobble things to fix cars, buildings, sewers, etc. Just like farmers that have no money but still had to plow and harvest, but figured a way to make things work.

My mother said I had to finish what I promised to do because your word is more important than money. My hands were bleeding when I finished and my mother said "good, that will teach to look closer when you agree to do a job". The son of the old couple sent me a letter and said several kids quit the job and he never seen a kid work harder for so little money and thanked me for my work ethic. I have still misjudged some jobs but not by too much now.

We are not taught much in school when compared to real life. I have had hundreds of people work for me and I tend to hire people were farmers, machinists, manual workers because they know how to work. I shy away from very highly educated applicants because they know mostly how to talk and present what others have done, not do the work. What makes a good inventor? People that have a good idea and want to stick to it until they prefect the inventor. We concentrate on the process of inventing here at ICMM. I distrust any government involvement, passing forms from one desk to another and looking for money and credit is not my idea of help.

We want to have our inventors to do as much as they can themselves (with guidance) and hire out experts when needed. We are not paranoid about showing others your inventions that will help you improve or complete it.

I am very weary of investors that review your product and want control of your idea to take it to market. A workman is worth their hire and it they invest their money they need a good return to justify the risk, but a few just want to steal the idea to make money, so be careful.

The reason I keep coming to the ICMM is to help people. The leaders don't make any money here. I don't allow any expenses without multiple signature approvals. I have my own Manufacturing company and sell tools all over the world. I like the design and engineering challenges not the selling, but the work makes money, if not, it is just a hobby. Every person in our club is valued to me. Are some dreamers? Yes, but I hope they learn even if it is only how much hard work it takes to invent a product and take it to market without losing money. That is the value and gift this club gives the community.

I am getting old and want to go see my grand children more now my mother has passed and I do not have to provide daily support like the last few years, but this club now has a great foundation and I am proud to have been of help to so many people and want them to succeed.

We have a great board and they do a great job. Support them and keep the club active and have fun with each other. I am not resigning right now but will be transitioning out in the next year. This is the oldest inventors club in Michigan..
